Employees profiles and information about their salaries is also managed through it. CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

As the college is affiliated with Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar, the curriculum is designed by the university and implemented in the college. The curriculum provides a framework for the college's core-teaching and learning. Apart from the traditional teaching-learning methods of whiteboard and lecturing, our college places great emphasis on curriculum delivery through practical learning. The process of curriculum delivery is well planned, documented, and transparent. The IQAC of the college prepares an academic calendar before the beginning of the session. The list of holidays provided by the university or state government is also factored into it. The academic calendar within which all activities are circumscribed is distributed to all departments. The teaching workload is allocated by the HODs, keeping in view

the specialization of the teacher. The workload for the curriculum is distributed appropriately and the timetable is made available to the teachers well before the commencement of the academic year, which enables them to plan and prepare for their lectures effectively. Assiduous planning by the college IQAC precedes punctilious delivery by faculty members. Teaching methodology is a balance of the traditional chalk and talk method and modern, innovative ICTenabled pedagogy. Besides innovative and technological pedagogy, guest lectures, field visits, and other classroom activities like debates, group discussions, role playing, newspaper reading, etc. are frequently held in the college at departmental level. Remedial lectures are given on a regular basis to help students cope with curriculum difficulties and to streamline and support students who are learning in a vernacular medium. To monitor and to improve the preparedness of the students for final examinations, mid-semester exams, surprise tests, and class tests are the regular practices and prominent features of the college. The college pays utmost attention, through the adoption of various measures, to the holistic completion and execution of the prescribed curriculum and syllabus. The Principal conducts regular meetings with all faculty members to ensure that the plans are being implemented. The college's focus is on imparting quality education, leading to enhancement of employability and skills. In order to bridge the industry-academia gap, the college offers various value-added courses, add-on courses, short-term courses, and one-week workshops which are designed as per the requirements of the industry. The faculty is encouraged to attend seminars, conferences, and workshops, as well as Faculty Development Programmes and Quality Improvement Programmes conducted by the university, so that the quality of the dissemination of education can be enhanced.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution?

Feedback Obtained

The institute has a well-organized feedback system to monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching and learning. The standard feedback forms based on different matrices are prepared by the relevant committees and these are discussed and approved by the IQAC. The data collected from various stakeholders is analysed and then presented before IQAC prior to uploading it on the college website. Analysis of the feedback from students Feedback from students is collected by using a standardized questionnaire, which includes matrices like completion of the syllabus on time, relevance of the course content, use of teaching aids by the teacher, and overall teaching learning experience in the college. The data analysis shows that: All the students agree that the syllabus is fully covered and that also well in time. More than 90 per cent of the students agree on the relevance of the course content for employability and real-life situations. More than 95 of students agree that teachers use various e-resources and ICT as needed. Analysis of feedback from Alumni The Alumni meetings are a regular feature in the college, the aim of which is to take input from the former students. . Most of the alumni were highly appreciative of the college's infrastructure, its teaching, and the environment it provides for overall growth. Most of the alumni agreed that the courses were useful for employment and entrepreneurship. Analysis of feedback from Faculty • Most of the faculty members have expressed that the course content was relevant. Some suggestions given by the faculty like inclusion of practical training or on the job training, wherever relevant, must be introduced, were conveyed to the members of the BOS of the affiliating university. Analysis of feedback from Parents Feedback from the parents is taken by interacting with them during Parent Teacher Meet. • 96 of the parent respondents are satisfied with the curriculum. • 4 of the parents have emphasized the need for soft skills and personality development in the curriculum. The consolidated feedback report of all stakeholders is shared with the HODs and Coordinators and also discussed with the concerned departments for further suitable actions and decision-making. Actions Taken After collecting and analysing the feedback from the various stakeholders on curriculum aspects, suggestions are placed before the university Board of Studies for discussion and possible changes in the curriculum. Syllabus review is also done by the concerned subject faculty so that it can be implemented in the future. To incorporate the suggestions of the students, tutorial groups are made. Each group is allocated a teacher in-charge who reviews their grievances and takes their feedback regarding the problems/difficulties they face related to the curriculum of different subjects. The suggestions of the alumni have also been taken into account, and many of them have been implemented and included through newly added self-finance courses. Personality development classes are oriented towards making smart students fluent in English by polishing their skills so that they can express themselves efficiently and effectively. 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The college mentoring programs are designed to pair students with mentors or fellow students so that they can assist in students' growth. The goal of mentorship is to help mentees learn skills and information that will help lead them to success in their careers. Mentors are available to offer and serve as a resource to the mentees whenever a need may arise. This system helps the students to improve their academic performance, choose right career option and to become confident and self-dependent. The Students Advisory Committee is also framed for counseling, mentoring and guiding the students and for sensitizing the students about various issues like ragging, traffic rules, some socio-psycho problems etc. Naturally, one of the most important aspects of a successful mentorship program is the connection between a mentor and the mentee. Hence, in every department the Class Incharges deal with certain issues like attendance, academic performance etc. of the students by utilizing a variety of different tools, like social media, forums and group lectures. The mentor also examines the performance of the mentees in curricular and co-curricular activities. The mentors provide personal guidance to the weak students and support them for any kind of difficulty in their curriculum. They also make provision of remedial coaching for them and support them when required. The remedial coaching includes remedial classes, supervised tutorials and class tests. The students sharing identical problems and weaknesses

related to their syllabus are clubbed into some homogeneous groups. These groups are then separately taught by different teachers according to the nature of their difficulties. In addition, regular interaction sessions with the parents of the mentees are also conducted and they are informed about the academic progress of their children in each semester. Bridge courses have been created by the college. As per the initiative taken by the departments the students are divided on the basis of class, subjects into groups of 15-20 students. In this system the mentors meet the students individually to offer guidance and to impart basic knowledge. Peer-learning is recognized as the best-practice strategy for enhancing students learning experience and for promoting college student success. So, the mentees are encouraged to learn from their peers through workshops, group discussions and study groups. The mentor also works for finding out hidden talent of the students in various aspects of academic, co- curricular, and extra – curricular activities so that they can be promoted to do various activities in the concerned area for their holistic development. The mentors also contact and meet the parents of the mentees to discuss their progress or any other matter, as and when required.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The evaluation of the students on the basis of examinations is an integral part of the teaching-learning process. The College follows the guidelines of GNDU for internal evaluation and assessment procedure. At the beginning of new semester, the teaching faculty orients the students with the syllabus, its objectives and paper pattern. Counseling is also provided to students by the faculty members from time to time. The Examination Committee is created by the college for the smooth organization of internal examination and for the continuous assessment of the students. Along with the test results, home assignments, seminars, quiz, general behavior and attendance are taken into consideration while awarding internal scores to the students. The question papers for internal test examinations are prepared giving appropriate weightage to units/modules of the course as per the syllabus. Exams are conducted in a very disciplined and fair manner, wherein almost whole faculty of the college gets involved. Performance of the students in Internal Assessment is used for faculties to identify slow and advance learners in their subjects. Slow learners are encouraged to improve the performance in future by counseling sessions. Through continuous monitoring and evaluation of students on campus, the college identifies students requiring special attention and offers them necessary remedial measures. The intellectual and skill based development of the student is evaluated and monitored on continuous basis.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The academic and cultural calendar is prepared before the commencement of new session by the college faculty as per the guidelines of the affiliated university. The academic activities are carried out in the college throughout

the year as per university rules and regulations. The institute complies with the schedule given in the calendar for available working days, short and long Holidays, National Public holidays, Admission process, Semester wise Teaching Plans, Tentative University Examination days of semester, Tentative practical examination days and allocation of Internal Assessment work i.e. Project Assignment, Theory Assignment , Class tests, Practical assignment. As per academic calendar Institution follows all the related Curricular, Co-curricular and Extra-curricular activities for the better academic work and for all-round development of the students. The students are given preparatory break for preparation of their exams. They are also encouraged to seek the guidance of their teachers in case of any difficulty in their examination preparation. They are also intimated by their teachers well in advance about the deadline for assignment submissions, dates for class tests, presentations and their final semester exams. Various other activities performed by the institution included in calendar are as follows: Picnic / excursions to various places or institutes, Honoring alumni/ eminent persons, Women Day Celebration, Parent Teacher Meetings.

Every department maintain a stock register for the available equipment. Proper inspection and verification of stock takes place at the end of every year. The Examination and Timetable committee finalise the timetable in consultation with the principal for optimal use of the classrooms. Library The college has one central Library that remains open for the students from 9 AM to 4 PM. The central library consists of about 24700 books, encyclopedias, periodicals, journals, magazines and newspapers etc. which can be easily accessed even by the outsiders. Maintenance and utilisation of these library sources are done in accordance to the library rules. The requirements and list of books is taken from the concerned department and HODs are involved in the process. The finalised list of required books is duly approved and signed by principal. Suggestion box is installed inside the reading room to take user's feedback. Sports amenities All the sports amenities are under the in-charge of the department of Physical Education. The maintenance of court is done regularly. Common facilities like ground and multi-purpose indoor sport facilities are provided to the sister institutions on prior request. Maintenance of playgrounds is done by employing full-time gardeners. Additionally: In order to ensure maintenance and repairs, adequate in-house staff is employed to meticulously maintain hygiene, cleanliness and infrastructure on the campus so as to provide a congenial learning environment. To bridge the gap between the academic and industry need, Value Added and Skill Oriented Courses are conducted regularly in our College in addition to regular courses. During this session, college started "Diploma in Aviation Management and Catering" course for which the college designs the syllabi in association with the industry partners and subject experts and same is sent to the University for approval. The college has well qualified and Teaching and Learning experienced faculty. The college follows the academic calendar as per the GNDU, Amritsar guidelines, To keep the teachers and students up-to-date with latest developments in their respective field different seminars, workshops and extension lectures are organised . For all round development of students, add- on courses and skill development programs are successfully running in the college. Faculty members make their planning calendar for the whole semester of successful implementation of curricular and cocurricular activities. Examination and Evaluation The evaluation process is carried out on the basis of Mid Semester Test, class tests, assignments, projects, presentations as well as attendance. The evaluation is done carefully by faculty members according to university standards. The subject teachers analyze the marks or results obtained by the students in the examination. Students who fail and get low marks are selected as slow learners and remedial classes are conducted for those students. The remedial classes are conducted after the class hours or in free time for the students who need the coaching in the required courses. Research and Development To bring the quality in the area of academics, the faculty is motivated to pursue research in their respective

	subjects. The faculty members attend seminars, workshops, orientation and refresher courses which are organised by the universities and other institutions. The faculty writes research papers for National and International Journals and Books that enrich their academic record. The teachers are given liberal permission to pursue higher studies like M.Phil and Ph.D. Two teachers from the college completed their Ph.D during this session. Dr. Mandeep Kaur Gulati and Dr. Neeru completed their Ph.D from IKG, PTU.

Moreover, the campus supports maximum paperless work culture through the use of E-Governance Portal. Some of the alternate Energy initiatives are as follows: Solar Panel: Solar power is completely clean, it produces no air pollution, no water pollution, and no greenhouse gas effects. It is also carbon-free, no harmful emissions are released when electricity is being produced by solar panels. It also reduces the need for finite resources. Keeping this in my mind, KCW took the initiative of installing solar panels at the campus. The institute has installed rooftop solar projects which could reduce harmful air pollution, help the environment and enhance student learning while cutting electricity costs. At the same time, solar panels could help colleges to unplug them from grids fed by natural gas and coal power plants that produce air pollutants. Compost Pit: Institute use the method of compost pit which is beneficial for gardening purpose and this also maintain the neatness of the campus. Compost is commonly prepared by decomposing plant and food waste, recycling the organic materials so that the mixture is rich in plant nutrients and beneficial organisms such as worms and fungal mycelium. The campus use these things in gardening purpose to increase the fertility of soil. Solar based energy conservation: Instead of sensor based energy conservation, the institution has the facility of Solar based energy conservation. The lights of the campus use solar energy and are sensor based they automatically get off at daytime and switched on at night. Solar power is completely clean, it produces no air pollution, no water pollution, and no greenhouse gas effects. It is also carbon-free, no harmful emissions are released when electricity is being produced by solar panels. It also reduces the need for finite resources. Keeping this in my mind, KCW took the initiative

of installing solar panels at the campus. The institute has installed rooftop solar projects which could reduce harmful air pollution, help the environment and enhance student learning while cutting electricity costs. At the same time, solar panels could help colleges to unplug them from grids fed by natural gas and coal power plants that produce air pollutants. This saves the sources of money, which are used for the betterment of the students. LED lighting: LED lighting is a green way to improve campus safety. The institution has replaced all lights with LED bulbs because it is more energy efficient and less expensive to operate and maintain. Solid Waste Management: The primary goal of the institute is to reduce and eliminate adverse impacts of waste materials on human health.

7.2 - Best Practices

Colleges undertake different types of best practices as per their institutional environment, try to bring about innovations and new ideas. Traditional system of teaching-learning and college as the place meant only to cater knowledge. KCW is a hub of greenery there are various plants and beautiful gardens which are well maintained. Variety of flowers makes the campus green, colourful and attractive. There is a little nursery which is well maintained by the gardeners. Institute use the method of compost pit which is beneficial for gardening purpose and this also maintain the neatness of the campus. Compost is commonly prepared by decomposing plant and food waste, recycling the organic materials so that the mixture is rich in plant nutrients and beneficial organisms such as worms and fungal mycelium. The campus uses these things in gardening purpose to increase the fertility of soil. The NSS and NCC wings of the college take up planting saplings regularly. The Botany department of the college maintains a green house which houses a large variety of medicinal plants and wide variety of plant species. The campus is also smoke free. The dead leaves and waste papers are not allowed to be put on fire. The dead leaves and waste papers are scientifically decomposed off by burying them in the soil. Use of pesticides and other harmful chemicals in the garden is replaced by adopting organic methods of gardening wherever possible. In order to dispose the acid fumes, chemistry labs are equipped with exhaust fans and fume hoods. Mild chemicals are used for cleaning and maintaining the campus. The College conducts awareness programmes on energy conservation and adopts measures to ensure that energy is conserved wherever possible. Every department follows a policy of switching on power only when required and switching off when not in use. The institution strictly observes to see that no electric equipments run unnecessarily. Thus enough measures are taken to use electricity carefully. Almost all the computer monitors in use are LED, LCD or TFT types to ensure minimum usage of electricity and also to reduce the level of radiation.    play a more critical role in quality assurance Organising regular Debate
competitions and other extracurricular activities in the college also serve in
 generating self-confidence and self-reliance in them and making them mentally
 strong. To make them spiritually strong and stable, we hold various religious
  activities annually such as ArdaasDiwas, Akhand Path (which is held twice a
year), give tests on various topics in Divinity and also provide scholarships.
All this is being done just for the overall personality development, safety and
  security of our students in life. The College has made arrangements for the
parking of the vehicles of the students and staff near the entrance. This helps
in keeping the campus as much clean as possible. CCTV is installed at strategic
 locations in the campus and the monitoring unit is housed in the Principal's
  chamber to get a quick review of the activities in the college at different
  locations. This enhances the security system in the college as it also has
  recording facility. Technology enabled learning environment is ensured. The
basic computer knowledge has been made compulsory for all the students and the
 teachers. All the teachers have been instructed to have an email ID, so that
important information could be shared instantly. This practice has enabled the
   teaching faculty to use computers and internet to improve their teaching
   practices. An acknowledgement is provided to the students for receiving

  Committee convener. Students desirous of claiming admission under special

  to submit a copy of the application with necessary documents to either the
  Principal or Sports Director in person. Based on being satisfied with the
documentary evidence, admissions are provided. Students from outside the state
 are encouraged to join the college and such of those students are required to
   meet the Principal in person and seek admission. Subject to eligibility
  certificate and migration certificate issued by the concerned universities,
admission is made either on the basis of merit or from the Management quota. To
  ease the admission process and hasten the process, dedicated computers with
    good printers and high speed internet are essential. A Robust admission
software is required to be generated and custom made due to various constraints
  in generating the admission register, day book entries, receipt generation,
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etc. Academic planner along with the calendar of events is uploaded on the website for information to students. The teaching learning committee along with the heads of different departments monitor the pace of coverage of the syllabus. Informal feedback is obtained from students regarding the content delivery by different teachers. The teaching - learning committee members and the class teachers hold frequent informal meetings and cull out the information needed. Frequent assignments, tests and evaluation are conducted to improve performance in the semester - end examinations.
